

Whether a person is born with a disability or acquires one later in life, ADRS programs for children and adults with disabilities can provide the foundation to help them reach their maximum potential.



The ADRS continuum of care supports thousands of Alabamians – from the day they're born throughout their lifetime ... or until they no longer need us.

The ADRS continuum of care serves children and adults with disabilities through four main programs:



Early Intervention

Alabama's Early Intervention System

provides services for children under three years old who either have a diagnosed physical or mental condition that is likely to lead to developmental delay or show signs of a developmental delay in one or more of the following areas:

- Cognitive learning
- Physical, vision, or hearing
- Language or communication
- Social/Emotional
- Self-care or adaptive skills

AEIS also provides training and support for families as their first and most important teachers. EI trains, empowers, and equips parents and caregivers with strategies to help their children learn as they participate in everyday activities.

There is no cost for services and anyone can refer a family; they can even refer themselves.

Children's Rehabilitation Service

Children's Rehabilitation Service provides a statewide system of services for children with special health care needs and their families, and adults with hemophilia. CRS provides specialty medical services including:

- Information and Referral
- Clinical Evaluation & Specialty Clinics
- Patient and Family Education
- Care Coordination
- Parent & Youth Connection

CRS collaborates with doctors, local schools, and a network of clinical and therapeutic providers to deliver medical, rehabilitative, and educational support services helping children to be as independent as possible.

The Hemophilia Program provides supervised disability management, patient education, self-infusion education, and medical treatment for those with hemophilia and other bleeding disorders.

Vocational Rehabilitation Service

Vocational Rehabilitation Service strives to increase self-sufficiency, enhance employment opportunities, and empower Alabamians with disabilities to achieve their maximum potential.

VRS provides individualized employment- and education-related services, training, assistive technology, and ongoing support to help youth and adults with disabilities reach their employment goals.

VRS also collaborates with local high schools, technical/junior colleges, and universities statewide to provide transition services that help students with disabilities accomplish their education goals.

The VRS Blind-Deaf division provides specialized assistance through its four major programs: Blind and Low-Vision Services, Deaf and Hard-of-Hearing Services, OASIS (Older Alabamians System of Information and Services), and the Business Enterprise Program, which supports blind vendors across the state working to become successful business owners.

SAIL State of Alabama Independent Living Homebound Service

The State of Alabama Independent Living (SAIL) - Homebound Service helps Alabamians with the most-significant disabilities achieve their independence with compassionate, skilled and trusted counselors, nurses, and specialists.

SAIL provides in-home education, counseling, attendant care, training, medical, and vocational services to ensure independent living can be achieved at home, at school, at work, and in the community.

SAIL also advocates and strives for a higher quality of life for its consumers by individualizing their services and building confidence in their abilities through a comprehensive and personalized approach.

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The services described in this brochure are funded in part with federal funds awarded by the U.S. Department of Education under the Vocational Rehabilitation (VR), Supported Employment Services, and the Independent Living Services for Older Individuals Who are Blind (OIB) programs. For purposes of the VR program, the federal VR grant paid 78.7 percent of the total costs of the program. In federal fiscal year (FFY) 2021, the VR agency received \$69,023,328 in federal VR funds. Funds appropriated by the state paid 21.3 percent of the total costs (\$18,681,028) under the VR program. For purposes of the Supported Employment program, federal funds paid 95 percent of the total costs. In FFY 2021, the VR agency received \$478,633 in federal Supported Employment funds. Funds appropriated by the state paid 5 percent (\$26,591) of the total costs incurred under the program. For purposes of the OIB program, federal funds paid 90 percent of the total costs incurred under the program. In FFY 2021, the agency received \$470,531 in federal grant funds for this program. Funds appropriated by the state paid 10 percent (\$52,281) of the total costs incurred under the OIB program.
