Alabama's Department of Rehabilitation Services existing mission is "One Department. One Mission." Our mission is to enable Alabama's children and adults with disabilities to achieve their maximum potential. To ensure Alabama's children with disabilities can accomplish this, we are committed to reaching all potential children with disabilities through the Child Find system.

Project/Activity: Alabama's Early Intervention participates in the Collective Impact Model for Part C (CIM-C) project. This project study will provide developmental screening procedures, culturally responsive communication, increase multi-sector collaboration, expand Local Child Find Teams (LCFT) to more community programs, and increase referral rates to Part C services of traditionally underserved or under-identified infants and toddlers.

- 2. Based on your proposed project or activity, what barriers may impede equitable access and participation of students, educators, or other beneficiaries?
 - Alabama's Early Intervention System (AEIS) is closing the referral gap through CIM-C project; however, AEIS is struggling with recruiting and retaining qualified personnel to serve infants and toddlers. Due to this barrier, high turnover rates and burnout are frequently occurring. Another barrier is having an adequate developmental screening or process in rural communities. 55 out of 67 Alabama counties are considered rural. It is difficult for some rural families to access and afford quality care, which leads to referrals not being made adequately.
- **3.** Based on the barriers identified, what steps will you take to address such barriers to equitable access and participation in the proposed project or activity?
 - Alabama has launched an initiative to recruit and retain highly qualified personnel through community collaboration and partnerships.

 To continue to work with the CIM-C project to improve the infrastructure to ensure equitable screening and referral practices, both in-person and remotely.
- 4. What is your timeline, including targeted milestones, for addressing these identified barriers? CIM-C is a five-year project cycle. This project began in 2022 and will end in 2027. Year 2-4 we will use referral and tracking systems to reflect stakeholder input and ensure referral rates to Part

<u>C</u> of traditionally underserved or under-identified infants and toddlers are more than Year 1 of the project.

Public awareness committees will target universities, local community agencies, job fairs, health fairs, etc. on a continuously basis to recruit highly qualified personnel to serve infants and toddlers in Alabama.
